The workshops are facilitated by presenters from urban and rural settings focusing on topics such as social justice, trade books, and integrating ELA and Social Studies.

First Session:

- It's Elementary, Presenters Ellie Leach and Nick Stamoulacatos, Syracuse City School District
 - This workshop will demonstrate one district's journey in developing an upper elementary social studies curriculum with common initiatives aligned to the new social studies practices and an alignment to writing as aligned to the CCLS. Participants will embark on exploring the resources used within the curriculum and leave with an exemplar unit as well as a raffle for some of the trade books used in the curriculum.
- Everybody Wins: Building Positive Partnerships with Historic Sites, Rebecca Stephens, Eagle Hill Middle School, Fayetteville-Manlius CSD
 - Many of our local, and not so local, historic sites are understaffed and underfunded and yet they possess phenomenal resources that are sitting in

drawers. This session will talk about the benefits that will come from building a partnership between educators and historic sites. We will also share lesson plans that have developed as a result of our collaboration.

Second Session:

- Using John Lewis's March to Teach About Social Justice, Dr. Nicole Waid, SUNY Oneonta
 - The combination of visuals and text in graphic novels have been viewed as an effective way to teach about social justice in middle school social studies classes. Graphic novels are effective texts to use in when teaching about social justice because of their first person narrative format. Incorporating graphic novels into the curriculum helps students contextualize the social studies content related to social justice. John Lewis's March can be used as the basis of historical inquiry in middle school social studies classrooms to motivate students by invigorating instruction and putting contemporary issues into context.
